4.6 Approve the Assignment of Teachers According to Education Code Sections 44258.3 and 44258.7 (c) & (d) and Board Policy 4113 (Action)

#### **Background Information:**

The San Diego County Office of Education staff reviews the assignment and credential requirements of all teachers working in the district. A preliminary credential audit took place last school year and several teachers were found to be teaching outside their area of authorization. The Education Code allows the Board of Education to approve teachers to teach outside of their credential authorization under certain circumstances.

#### Report:

Article XXV of the ACT Agreement labeled Committee on Assignment (COA) provides for two district committees to review teacher misassignments: one committee for grade levels K-5 and the other for grade levels 6-12.

The COA process supports the governing board of a school district to assign the holder of a credential, other than an emergency permit, to teach any subjects in departmentalized classes in kindergarten or any of grades 1 to 12 (Education Code 44258.3). The COA verifies the teacher has adequate knowledge of each subject to be taught.

In order for a teacher to be recommended to teach a subject in which he/she has expertise but does not have a credential, the policies and procedures outlined in Education Code 44258.3 must be applied.

Both the K-5 and the 6-12 COA reviewed each affected teacher's evidence of subject matter expertise, demonstrated knowledge of the curriculum framework for the subject to be taught and graduate level coursework to determine that the teachers not credentialed in a subject area have adequate knowledge of the subject(s) to be taught.

The K-5 Committee on Assignment reviewed and approved the subject matter expertise of both Debbie Williams and Wendy VanLandingham.

The K-5 COA recommends the CUSD governing board approve the teaching assignments for:

- Debbie Williams to teach the specialist hourly science program at Village Elementary
- Wendy VanLandingham to teach the specialist hourly Visual and Performing Arts (VAPA) program at Silver Strand Elementary.

The 6-12 COA recommends the CUSD governing board approve the teaching assignments for:

• Gail Massey to teach the Biotechnology course at Coronado High School.

# Brian Bent Memorial Aquatics Complex Update October 18, 2012 - Board Meeting

- 1. Fall started off with unusually warm weather. This weather benefited us by keeping BBMAC utility bills down. The gas heaters and solar panels were turned off for most of August, September, and the beginning of October. We will begin tarping and hopefully stave off turning on the 50 meter heaters for another week or two.
- 2. Fall lessons have been filling rapidly. With the unusually warm weather and popular feedback, scheduled lessons continue to be full in the afternoons. The last day of fall lessons will be on November 8.
- 3. The BBBMAC Winter training schedule is still being stretched! We are still receiving requests for winter break training. I have two quotes out now with less than favorable pool times that we are waiting for teams to confirm on.
- 4. Boy's CHS Water Polo Season has begun with several home games and weekend tournaments. Events have been running smoothly and efficiently.
- 5. Both CNSA and CAC saw a boom in participation. Each team has grown significantly this fall. The BBMAC is a very busy place if you stop by after 4:00pm!
- 6. We are now working on our spring schedule in addition to refining the winter schedule. We had a rental request from OLP/Saints High School Club teams for pool space this spring. I am currently working on the long term rental groups to firm up plans and offer a quote to the head coach of OLP/Saints.
- 7. CNSA began an afternoon Masters Swim program. This will run Monday-Friday from 11:30-1:15pm. This is a great addition to groups in the BBMAC pool and adds to our facilities schedule, which fills in some incredibly empty hours.

4.8 Uniform Complaint Quarterly Report

#### **Background Information:**

In May 2000 the ACLU and other public interest law firms and organizations filed a lawsuit alleging that the state of California lacked equal access to instructional materials and basic resources; provided inadequate instruction; and had massive overcrowding and inadequate, unsafe and unhealthy facilities. A settlement was reached in August 2004 resulting in several pieces of legislation requiring immediate implementation. Many of the new requirements apply to low performing schools, and some apply to all school districts and schools.

The Williams Settlement requires school districts to submit quarterly reports to the San Diego County Office of Education (SDCOE) on complaints each district has received related to instructional materials, emergency facilities issues, and teacher vacancies and misassignments.

#### Report:

This is the first quarter of the 2012-2013 school year reporting period. The District has received no complaints.

The District is committed to safe and secure campus environments for all students. Each site principal develops and updates school disaster preparedness/safety plans annually.

#### **Report:**

The comprehensive Safety Plans for five schools are included under separate cover and are available for review at the District Office.

In addition, basic emergency procedures and identifying primary and secondary evacuation locations for all schools will be posted on the school websites.

#### **FEES AND CHARGES**

#### 6.0 <u>DISTRICT ORGANIZATION AND BOARD OPERATION</u>

6.1 Coronado School of the Arts (Report)

#### **Background Information:**

Coronado School of the Arts, CoSA, was established in 1996 by the CUSD Board of Education as a school-within-a-school arts program at Coronado High School. Funding for the program was established through a special allocation of general funds, a Specialized Secondary Program (SSP) Grant for \$260,000, and private monies provided through the establishment of the CoSA Foundation, a California tax-exempt corporation. The CoSA program began with 60 students, grades 9-12, and provided accelerated education in the following arts areas: Classical & Contemporary Dance, Instrumental Music, Musical Theatre & Drama, Technical Theatre, and Visual Art. A sixth department, Digital Media, was added to CoSA curricular program in 2007-2008.

#### Design of the Program

CoSA students must apply, interview, and audition or show a portfolio for entrance into the program. CoSA students must maintain a 2.0 overall grade point average (GPA) and a 2.75 CoSA course grade point average (GPA) while they are in the program. The components of the program are as follows:

- Pre-professional arts conservatory training with a school-to-career emphasis
- An individualized learning environment
- The academic day in the morning with arts classes in the afternoon until 4:30 pm
- Teachers for specialized classes who are professionals in their fields
- Authentic assessment (juries) twice a year for all students
- Partnerships with arts businesses and higher education

#### CoSA Departments:

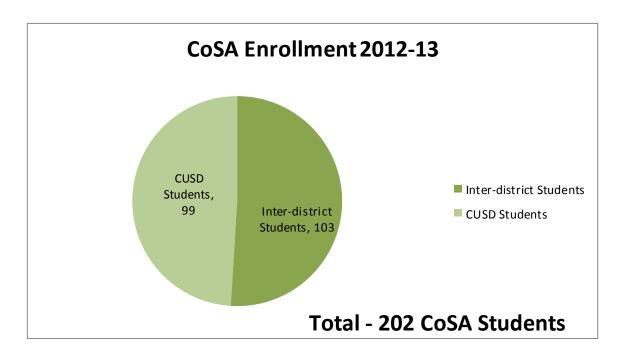
- Classical & Contemporary Dance
- Digital Media and Filmmaking
- Instrumental Music
- Musical Theatre & Drama
- Technical Theatre
- Visual Art

The CoSA program prepares students for college-level arts conservatory training and Career Technical Education. Special emphasis on auditioning for college arts programs is a feature of the junior and senior years. This special preparation helps CoSA seniors to be competitive when they audition for major performing arts schools and when they present their visual art or media art portfolios to major arts schools. The preparation includes:

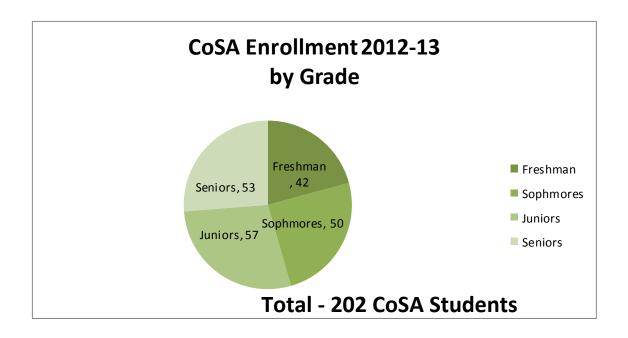
- Providing jury experiences twice a year
- Helping students prepare art, media, and technical theatre portfolios and auditions for theatre, music, and dance
- Providing access to major higher education programs by inviting college recruiters to present on our campus, college fairs, and by assisting students with searches for appropriate programs
- Encouraging and supporting students to do their best academically

#### **Enrollment**

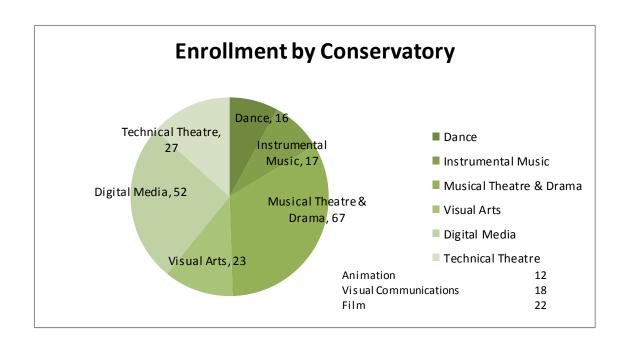
The CoSA program is presently in its seventeenth year of operation. This year's enrollment is 202 students, which is the same as last year. As of the writing of this report, there are 103 inter-district transfer students, or 51 percent of the enrollment.



Interest in and demand for CoSA from both in-district and out-of-district students remains high. Fifty-four percent of students enrolled in CoSA are juniors or seniors. CoSA was named a unique specialized secondary program by the San Diego County Office of Education in 2009, which enables CUSD to accept IDT's for CoSA from our neighboring districts.



The breakdown of students within each of CoSA's six departments is shown below. In addition to the 202 full-time CoSA students, CHS students participate in Electronic Music, Stagecraft, Animation, Video Production, Visual Communications, Electronic Music and Band.



#### CoSA Recruitment

CoSA sponsors one Open House, one Prospective Student Workshop, and an early decision Audition/Portfolio Day on the CHS campus each year. This year the CoSA Open House is November 6, 2012; the Prospective Student Workshop is January 28, 2013; and the Early Decision Audition/Portfolio Day is February 23, 2013. CoSA faculty and students recruit students from Coronado by partnering with CMS teachers and presenting an eighth grade assembly each year. Additional recruitment for San Diego County students is achieved by presenting assemblies and workshops at partner schools, through individual contracts with private and charter schools in the greater San Diego area, as well as outreach to youth arts organizations.

#### Career Technical Education (CTE)

Career Technical Education is a relatively new area of interest by the California State Department of Education. The standards were published in 2006, and CUSD also adopted them that year. A CTE designation by the state requires that the program has career pathways in at least one of the Industry Sectors designated by the standards and sequences of courses in each pathway. CoSA is set up in this manner, and, therefore, qualifies. CoSA is a state leader with three pathways in Career Technical Education. The state will be releasing new CTE standards soon and CoSA will use these standards to guide our 21st century curriculum and instruction.

#### Grants and Awards

Coronado School of the Arts Foundation was awarded a California Arts Council grant to provide CoSA students with "Artists in Schools." CoSA will have two professional artists working with the Drama, Dance, Digital Media and Technical Theatre students during the 2012-2013 school year. The two projects are a dance and digital media interdisciplinary performance and a playwriting project.

Coronado Unified School District has received Carl Perkins funding to support expanding the network of Arts, Media and Entertainment programs in California. Coronado School of the Arts will be a demonstration school to help meet the goals of the Perkins Leadership contract. By participating in sharing best practices CoSA will gain new ways to continue being a leader in the state.

During the 2011-2012 school year Coronado School of the Arts students, productions and exhibits earned twelve local and national awards for excellence in the arts.

#### Strategic Planning

On September 7<sup>th</sup>, 30 CoSA staff and CoSA Foundation board members met to initiate a five year Strategic Plan. CoSA has aligned action steps to support the Coronado High School strategies and the CUSD Governing Board goals. Currently, the CoSA Director and staff are working to finalize the plan.

#### CoSA Graduates

2012 CoSA graduates received over \$149,000 in college scholarships. 2012 graduates are attending a variety of colleges around the country including UC campuses (Irvine, Santa Cruz and UCLA School of Theatre, Film & Television), DePaul University, Pomona College, Rutgers University, Oklahoma City College, Howard University and College of Charleston, as well as schools in Denver, New Orleans and San Francisco.

6.2 Learning Report: Including (1) Academic Performance Index (API) and Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) Results, (2) Mathematics Update, (3) Coronado High School Annual Report, (4) Palm Academy Annual Report

#### 1) API and AYP Results for 2012

#### **Background Information:**

The California Department of Education released the Accountability Progress Report for school districts across the state on October 11, 2012. This report includes a summary of progress on the State Academic Performance Index (API), and the elements used to determine Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP), the federal accountability program specified in the No Child Left Behind federal legislation. Additional information included the API calculation includes the California High School Exit Examination (CAHSEE).

#### **Report:**

The API is a scale from 200-1000 with the district and each school assigned a single number based on student performance on the State Testing and Reporting (STAR) program. The State set a score of 800 as the target for all schools which indicates that a school is high-performing. A school scoring over 900 is considered "well above average" and in the top 10% of schools throughout the State. This year 54% of San Diego County schools are at 800 or above. Our District API of 896 is our highest score ever achieved.

Palm Academy for Learning does not receive an API score due to the small student enrollment. It has alternative accountability measures and has met the achievement requirements for small, alternative high schools.

Federal regulations require that all California schools and districts receive Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) determination. The elements used to establish the AYP for 2012 include:

- 1. 2012 participation rate of 95 percent or greater in the STAR assessment program;
- 2. 2012 percentage of students proficient and above in English-language arts and mathematics as compared to the Annual Measurable Objectives (AMO) of 78% in English-language arts and 78.2% in mathematics in all significant district demographic subgroups, such as ethnicity, socioeconomically disadvantaged, English learner, and students with disabilities groupings;
- 3. School-wide or district-wide growth in API; and
- 4. School-wide or district-wide graduation rate for schools and districts with high school students of at least 90%.

A school or district must meet or exceed the annual targets for all four elements described above to make AYP for 2012. It is important to note that under No Child Left Behind, the targets for both English language arts and mathematics increase significantly over time, with the ultimate goal of 100% of students performing in proficient or advanced ranges by 2014. This year, Coronado High School, Village Elementary, and Silver Strand Elementary Schools met or exceeded all of the AYP criteria for that site, including a graduation rate of over 96.55% at Coronado High School. Coronado Middle School met 11 of 13 target areas. The two areas that were not met at CMS included white students (71.8% proficient or advanced, 6.4% below the target) and all students (70.6% proficient or advanced, 7.6% below the target). Additionally, CUSD's percent of students at or above proficient levels in English-language arts district-wide is 83.5% (83.7% in 2011) and our percent of students at or above proficient levels in mathematics district-wide is 76.8% (80.3%). Though both areas experienced a slight decrease from 2011, both areas are above the federal requirement for 2012. However, to make AYP as a District in 2012, there are 22 different demographic subgroup categories that CUSD must meet. In 2012, our District met 19 of 22 categories, thus we did not fully make AYP. Three demographic subgroups did not meet the target in mathematics only: Hispanic/Latino students (70.3% proficient/advanced), socioeconomically disadvantaged (69.5% proficient/advanced), and students with disabilities (52.6 proficient/advanced). Site administration and teachers, as well as our District Student Services department, is carefully reviewing this data and making plans for ensuring the progress of students in these subgroups.

With No Child Left Behind federal legislation requiring all schools ensure 100% proficiency of all significant demographic subgroups by 2014, CUSD's projection for 2013 in English-language arts and mathematics will increase from approximately 78% to approximately 86% in both academic areas. District and school staffs continue to understand the needs of significant demographic subgroups and providing appropriate interventions.

Each fall, District and school staffs review the summative data available to them. In conjunction with local formative assessments such as Measures of Academic Progress, indepth analysis allows staff members many dimensions in monitoring the academic progress of students in our District.

CST and API/AYP data and other internal assessment data is the foundation to site instruction, strategic plans, and professional development as well as continue the growth in the academic performance of every CUSD student.

#### 2) Mathematics

In this monthly Learning Report, information on the progress of increasing student mathematics achievement will be reported. Three reasons for this renewed K-12 focus on this core subject area are 1) the advent of the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) and the new Smarter Balanced Assessment (SBAC) which will measure student progress on these new standards in the 2014-15 school year, 2) the decrease in overall performance in math since 2011, and 3) that math has been CUSD's lowest performing core area for several years.

In order to improve mathematics achievement and simultaneously transition to the new CCSS math standards and the new SBAC assessment, CUSD administration, the Math Leadership Team, and all staff are studying the many aspects of our preschool-grade 12 math program that may be impacting math performance. To date, CUSD leadership has identified these focus areas:

- CUSD successes in mathematics and why they are working; how can math be better incorporated into science and other content areas
- Curricular resources for each grade and level, including resources for intervention services and special education
- Instructional strategies and student engagement and motivation
- Instructional minutes; homework expectations
- Professional development for teachers and administration on current best practices in math and ensuring a deep understanding of the CCSS and what it means to be math proficient (see chart below)
- Curriculum pacing for the entire year and alignment to the CST schedule; identification of essential standards and how students demonstrate proficiency
- Interventions
- Algebra readiness
- Grade level assessments, sharing of assessment data across levels, and correct student placements (the assessment of students in grades 3-8 and below proficient students in grades 9-12 in mathematics via Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) has already been planned)
- sharing information with parents about assessments, placements, and mathematics instruction
- continual collaboration within and across grades and levels

Following this deeper investigation, a system-wide mathematics plan will be developed and shared with the Board in the December Board report.

#### 3) Coronado High School Annual Report

#### **Background Information:**

Throughout the 2011-12 school year, Coronado High School has made progress in reaching site Strategic Planning goals, CUSD Board Goals, and WASC identified areas for follow up. In this report is information that includes a variety of assessment results and reports. The California Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program reports for 2012 have been reviewed and will be referenced in this update. In CST reports, students are identified as advanced, proficient, basic, below basic, and far below basic levels in the areas of English language arts, math, science, and social studies. In addition, information specific to efforts of the faculty at CHS are included and, where applicable, will reference alignment to site, district, and WASC goals.

#### **2012 Department Updates:**

English Language Arts: CSTs showed steady growth in all CST Cluster areas. SMART Goals initiated and/or met, AP enrollment and pass rates improved, and new benchmark assessments have been developed.

- Steady growth of students scoring PROFICIENT or ADVANCED (81% to 84% Eng 9, 77% to 82% Eng 10, 71% to 76% Eng 11)
- SMART Goal in Reading (see attached) has been initiated and met
- SMART Goal in Writing (see attached) has been initiated
- AP Language (65 students with an 85% pass rate to 87 students with a 90% pass rate)
- AP Literature (59% pass rate to 75% pass rate)
- New Benchmark Assessments to measure mastery of standards Grades 9-12 (CHS Strategic Plan, CUSD Board, and WASC Goal)

*Mathematics:* 2012 STAR results dipped in all math CST areas. SMART goals were not met. SMART goal key action step 5.1 was not met; action step 5.2 has been initiated and is in progress. AP math enrollment and pass rates improved, and new intervention courses developed.

- New intervention courses added in Algebra and Geometry (CHS Strategic Plan and CUSD Board Goal)
- New 'Essential Learning' assessments created in Algebra and Geometry (Board Goal)
- 'Like' teacher teams use of common/formative assessments and alignment of instructional pacing in Algebra, Geometry, and Algebra 2 (WASC Goal)
- Partnership with *Math for America* established
- AP Calculus AB (80% pass rate to 94% pass rate)
- AP Statistics (14 students tested to 22 students tested)

#### 2012 CST Math Declines:

- The decrease of students proficient or advanced in grade 9 Algebra by 12% with 24% of students performing proficient or advanced. This is the lowest grade 9 Algebra performance in 9 years. There is a four year trend of decreased proficiency in this course.
- The decrease of students proficient or advanced in grade 10 Algebra by 17% with only 8% of students performing proficient or advanced. However, it should be noted that there was a significant decrease in the number of students taking Grade 10 Algebra, indicating that more students are taking Algebra in grades 8 and 9.
- The decrease of students proficient or advanced in grade 10 Geometry by 13% with 24% of students performing proficient or advanced.
- The decrease of students proficient or advanced in grade 10 Algebra II by 10%, with 67% of students performing proficient or advanced. It should be noted that there was a significant increase in the number of students taking grade 10 Algebra II in 2012.

*Science*: 2012 CST results are encouraging. CHS had highest number of students ever tested in Physics, AP pass rates and enrollment increase in all areas, new uses of technology in Biology.

- Number of students enrolled in CHS science courses increases for *fourth* consecutive year.
- Science teachers' alignment of curriculum & assessment (CHS Strategic Plan Goal, CUSD Board Goal, WASC Goal)
- Number of students taking Physics CST nearly DOUBLES (CHS Strategic Plan Goal)
- Digital textbooks in Biology (CUSD Board Goal) 78% Proficient or Advanced in Biology
- Additional AP Biology course added

- AP Biology (from 44 to 61 students tested; from 59% to 61% pass rate)
- AP Chemistry (71% pass rate to 90% pass rate)
- AP Physics (from 58 to 73 students tested; from 72% to 74% pass rate)

*History:* World History and US History CST scores showed slight dip (-1to 3% Proficient or Advanced) with increased enrollment in both courses.

- New BIG HISTORY course introduced (CHS Strategic Planning Goal, CUSD Board Goal)
- Enrollment in AP Gov/Econ and AP Psychology increases (new sections added)
- Student fieldtrip to 2013 Presidential Inauguration
- Three week rotation in Government/Economics course piloted

Careful examination of 2012 CST data and cluster breakdown is underway by each department. This data will affect site strategic plans and interventions. Math and ELA Leadership Team meetings and several vertical articulation meetings are planned for the fall to consider successes and implement plans to reverse achievement gaps in grades, courses, and demographic subgroups.

#### **Interventions**

In response to supporting all students at Coronado High School, new resources were developed to provide a continuum of courses in specific academic areas. In addition, CHS has piloted an 'academic coaching' program that places interested students that have demonstrated success into classrooms to provide direct peer-tutoring services. Currently we have student volunteers supporting instruction in Algebra, Geometry, English Lab, and Foreign Language courses. Our faculty continues to send individual deficiency notices to parents of struggling students—a practice that support a positive grade adjustment to 45% of students receiving notice. All interventions/supports support Site Strategic Planning, CUSD Board, and WASC goals.

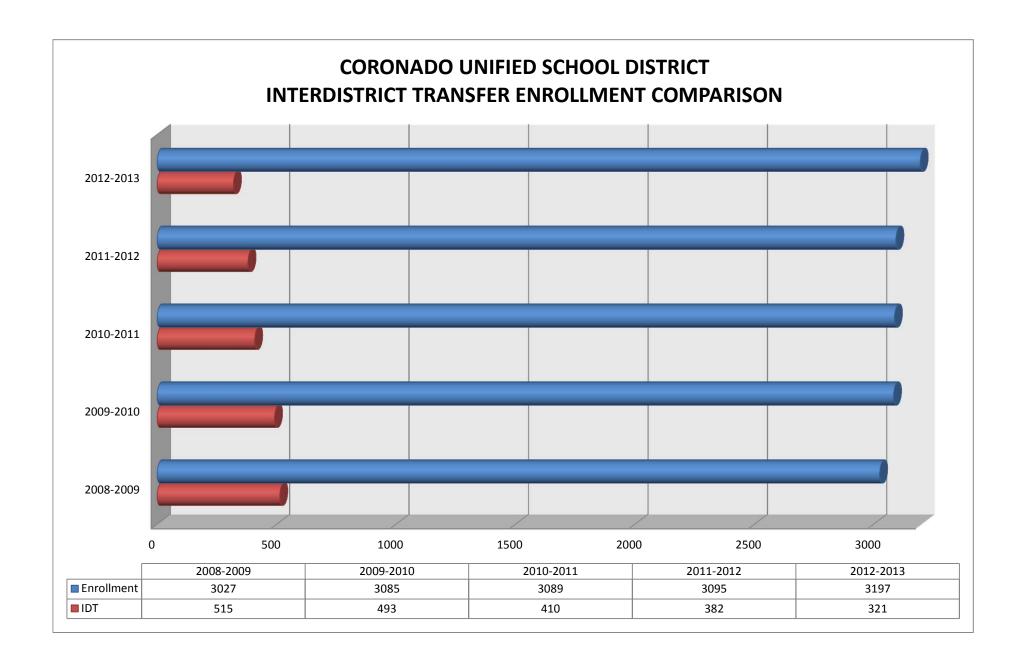

The attendance accounting process produces the District's average daily attendance (ADA) reporting to the State. Our ADA is funded through the Revenue Limit that is approximately 70% of the District budget.

#### **Financial Management**

• The next budget study meeting is November 13, 2012 where we will discuss the impact of the election results on CUSD. The budget includes a trigger cut of \$441 per ADA to revenue limit funding in the event that the Governor's tax initiative, Proposition 30 fails.

The attached table illustrates the status of the district's actions in all 21 areas. I will note that the target areas may be reduced to the following categories: *Done, Ongoing,* and *Addressable*. Any significant fiscal expenditure will most likely come from this latter category, i.e., Close Circuit Television (CCTV) costs, proximity card access control to individual/multiple sites and finally, landscaping costs to ensure effective use of prospective CCTV installations. The majority of the remaining actions categorized in the table will predominately require either district staff and/or consultant
